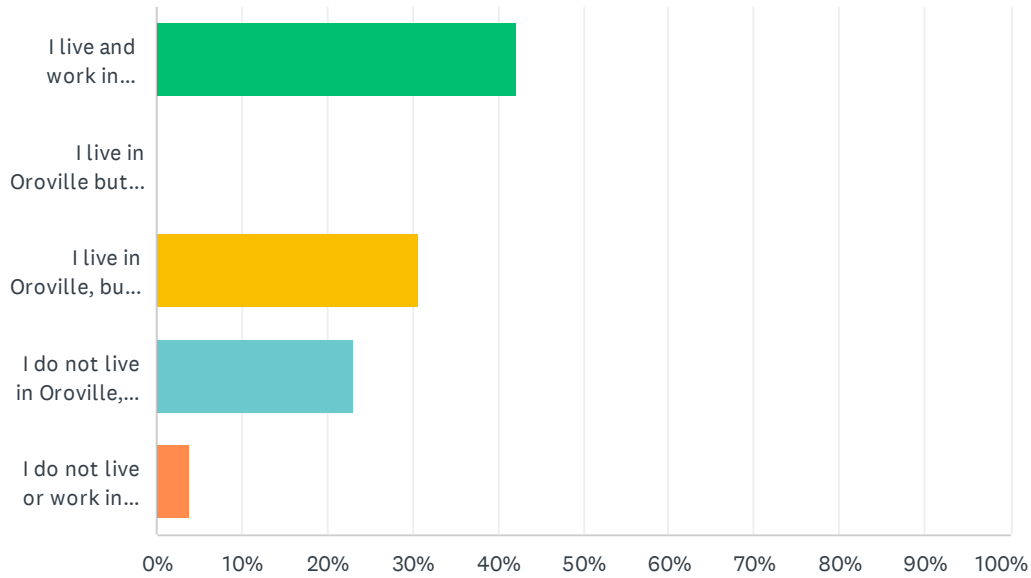


Q1 Do you live and/or work in Oroville?

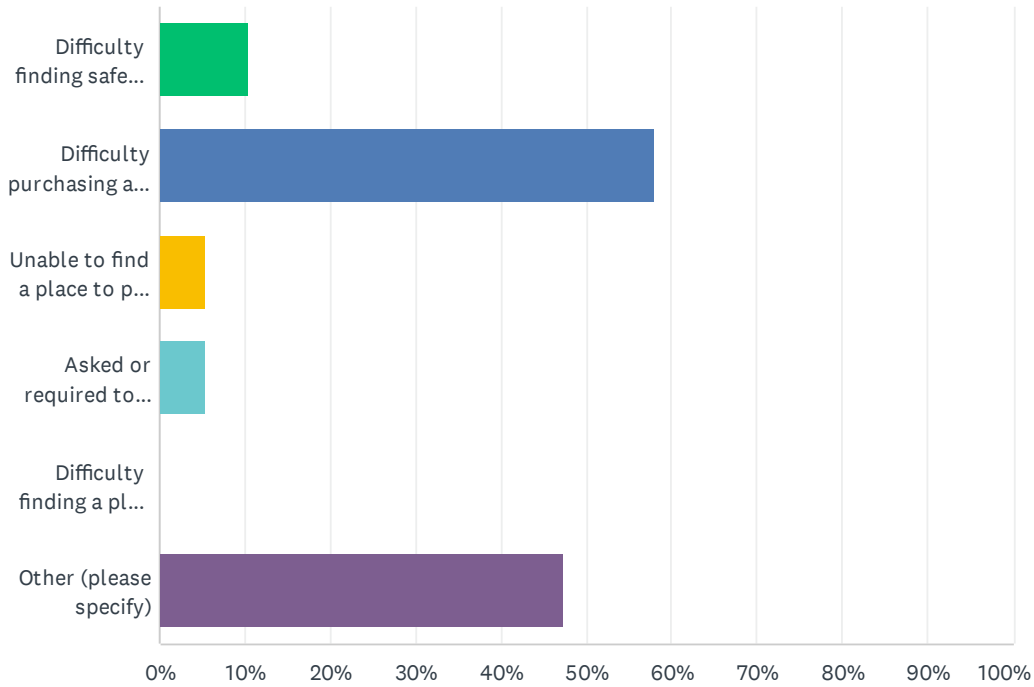

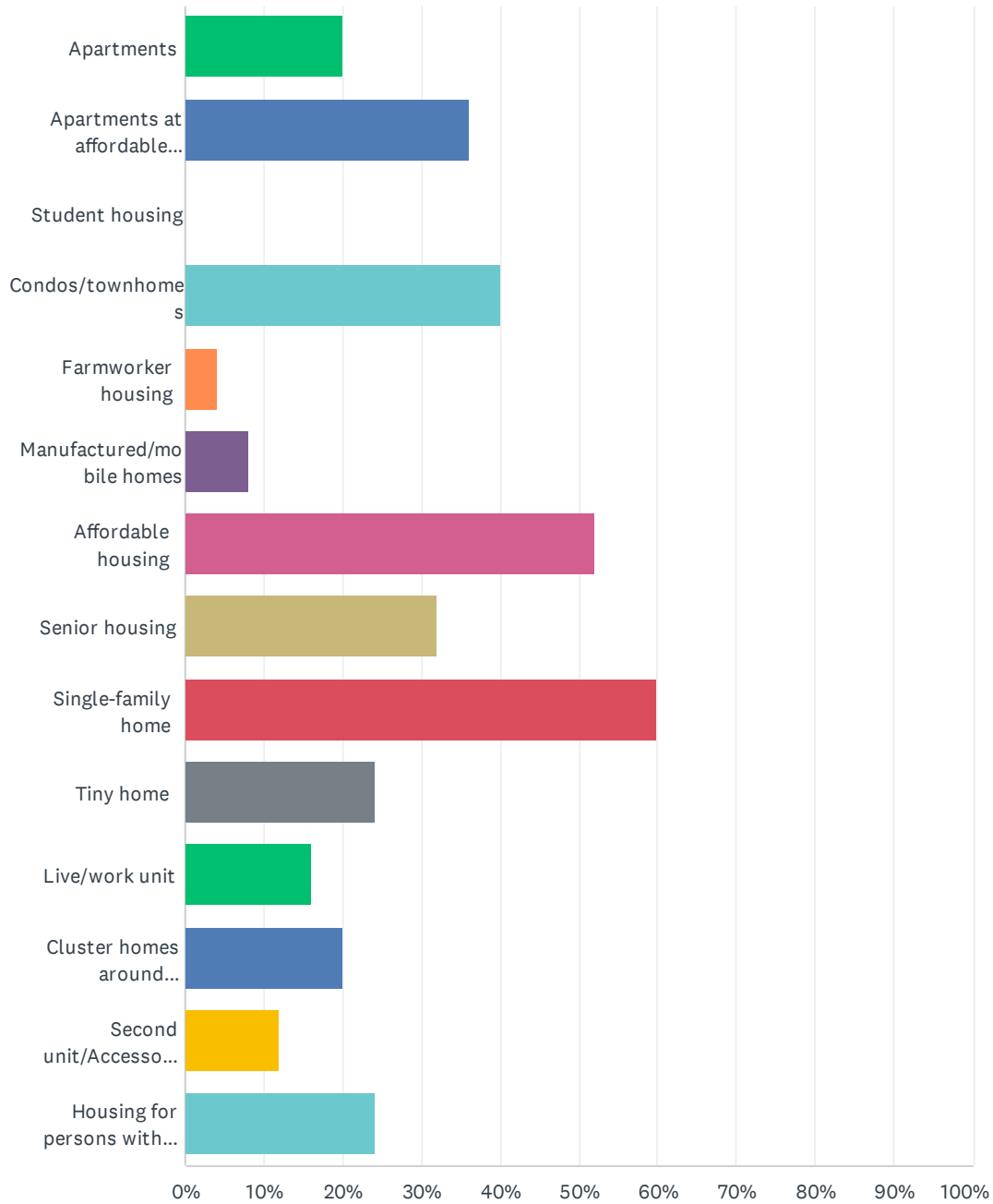

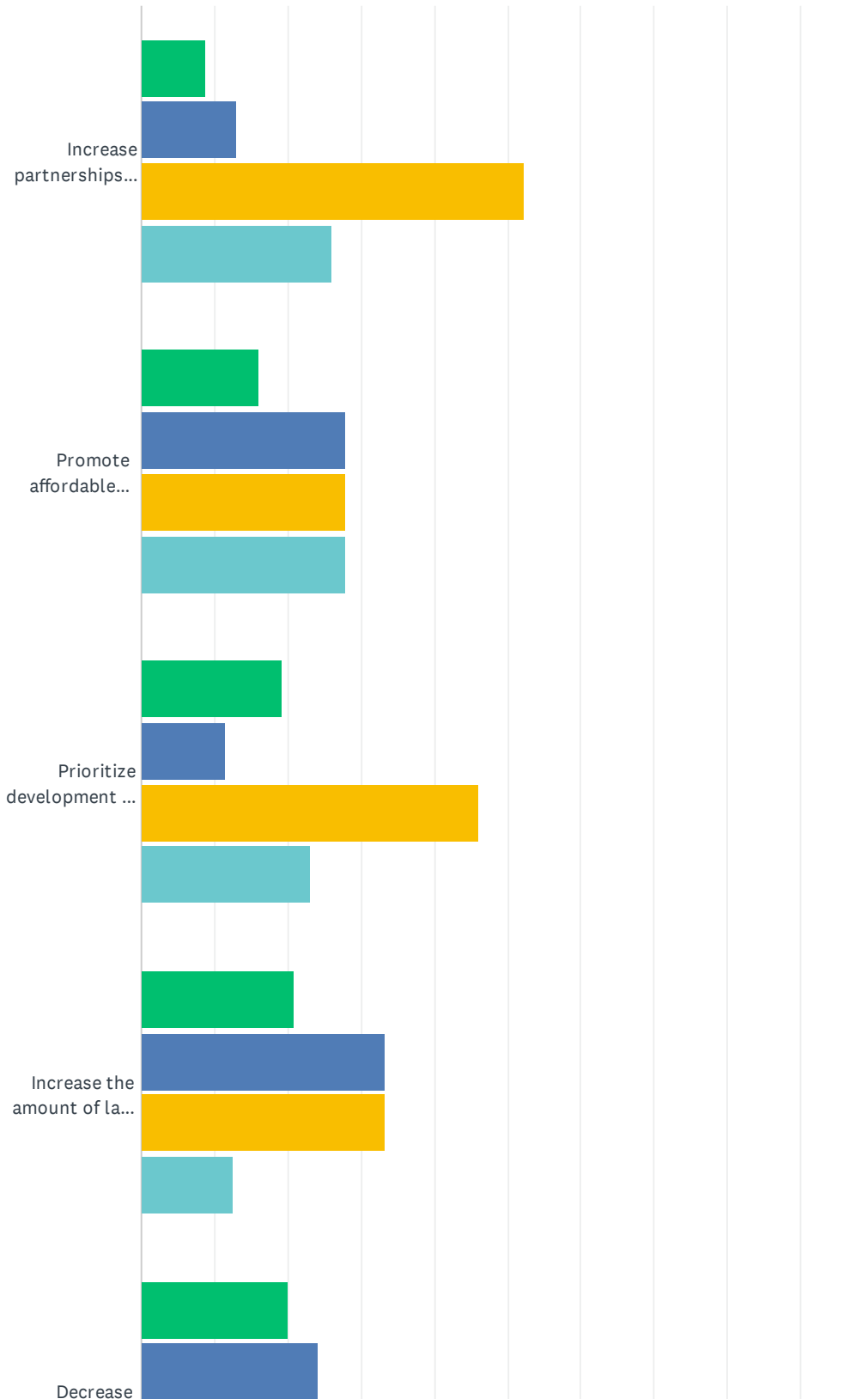

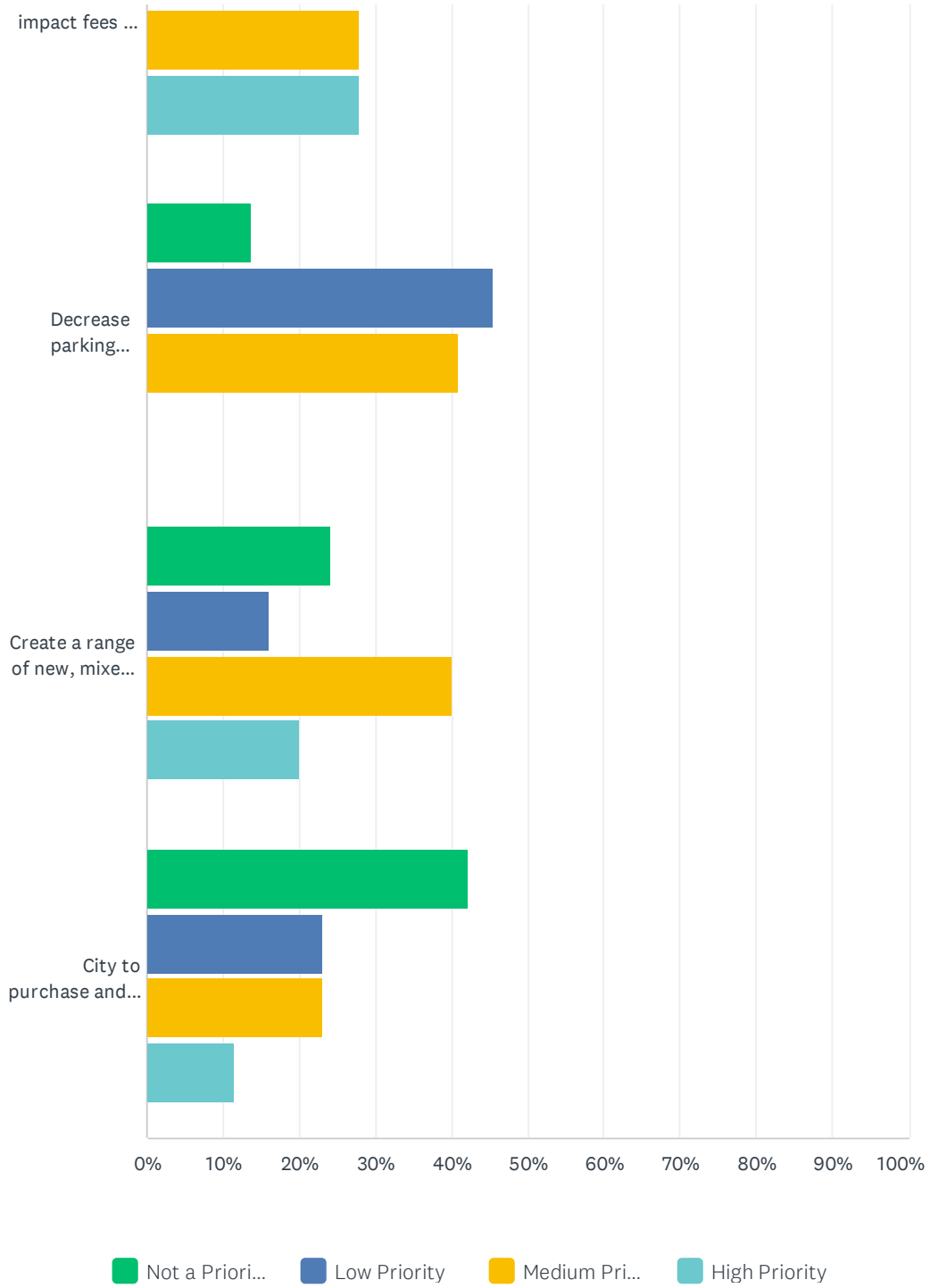

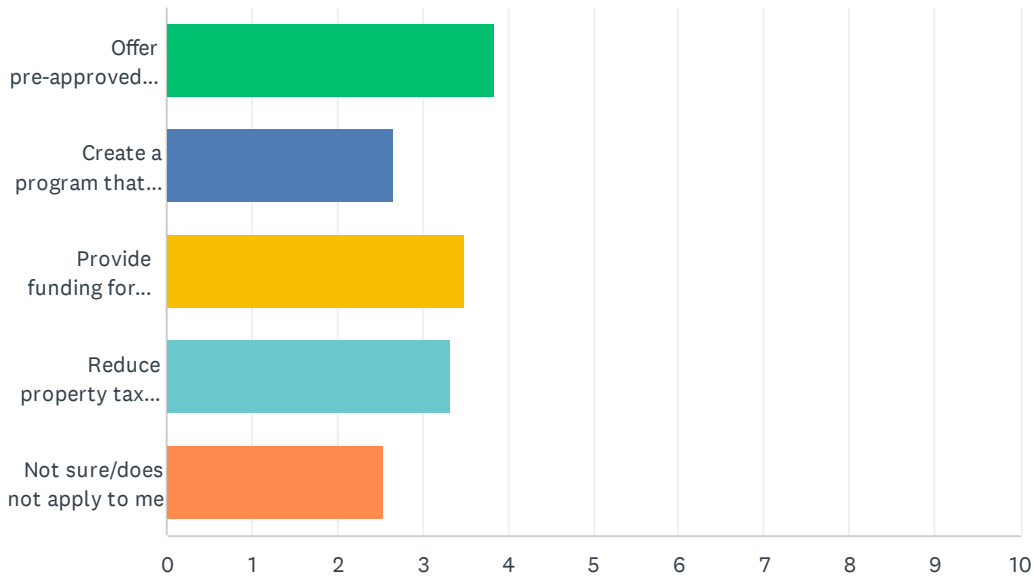
